Dates To Remember:

January 1

- First day to file the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)

January 31

- Priority deadline for admission to the University
- Priority deadline for submitting the WSU Academic Scholarship Application (**received by date**)

February 15

- Priority date to apply for financial aid by submitting the FAFSA. However, we encourage families to still submit the FAFSA after this date. Funds are limited, so applying as soon as possible is recommended.
- Priority date to submit WSU's application for summer financial aid.
